On April 22, Jerry Johnson, Barbara H. Robinson and I had a good book discussion about "A Passage to India." This novel depicts two cultures in the 1920s and has unusual wording with numerous themes and symbols. Following the book discussion, Barbara told about her recent Friendship Force trip to Cuba. She said that Cuba is grappling with economic stagnation and energy shortages that have severely impacted the quality of life for its citizens.

On April 25, Paul Ohlendorf led eleven members to the Soldiers Memorial Museum, where we had a free guided tour of the current "Ghost Army" exhibition. The 1,100-man unit was given a unique mission to deceive Hitler's forces and mislead them as to the size and location of Allied forces, while giving the actual units elsewhere time to maneuver. During their tenure, the Ghost Army carried out more than 20 deception campaigns, putting on a "traveling road show" using inflatable tanks, sound trucks, fake radio transmissions, scripts and pretense. Ghost soldiers were encouraged to use their brains and talent to mislead, deceive, and befuddle the German Army. Many were recruited from art schools, advertising agencies and other occupations that encouraged creative thinking. In civilian life, ghost soldiers had been artists, architects, actors, set designers, engineers and lawyers. Our guide did an excellent job of explaining how the Ghost Army operated and crucial battles where it was used. While three of its members were killed and approximately 30 were wounded, the Ghost Army saved the lives of between 15,000 to 30,000

Following the tour, we ate lunch at Rosalita's Cantina, where we shared stories about our travels and personal lives.

This best-selling novel delves into the life of a financier who rises to immense wealth by betting against the 1929 stock market crash.
